IN CASE YOU

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Iowa City Amateur Radio Club was called to order by President Mike Nowack, WBØHOG.

MISSED IT

Visitors were welcomed and everyone introduced himself. In the absence of Max Otto, WØLFF, minutes of the last meeting and the treasurer's report were read by Craig Fastenow, KØUJJ. Newsletter costs were \$11.51. Minutes were approved as read.

The Mall project was discussed at length. A motion was made and seconded to mail newsletters to all amateurs in Johnson County. The estimated cost is \$40. The motion was approved. Bob Lucas, WAØDXZ, reported on pictures to be taken for the display as well as for publication. Jerry Cooper, WNØPLZ, stated he has been unable to obtain insurance for the weekend project. It was suggested he contact the ARRL and also the CVARC to find out how they have handled situations such as this in the past. Jim Brady, WBØLKW, explained plans to have newspaper coverage in all papers throughout the county using pictures of local hams wherever possible. He will be writing to all schools in the area to inform them of the upcoming novice classes. He also will have as much radio and TV coverage as he is able to arrange. After the demonstration he will provide followup coverage. Dave Christ, KØLUM, reported on the progress of his committee. He is still looking for some equipment. There was no news from the antenna committee as yet. It has been estimated that we will need at least three operators at a time to work in shifts on both days so a paper was circulated for volunteers. Novice Classes will start on April 20. We need people to teach both code and theory. Classes will meet twice a week for six to eight weeks.

It was mentioned that we still need more local support for the Johnson County Emergency Net Sunday Evenings.

Another hidden transmitter hunt was suggested and since our last winner has moved, it was decided to draw names from a hat to select the fox. No date was set. Field Day is coming up. Ed Miltner, WBØOUP, volunteered to chair this group.

The meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m. After a short break we had the program for the evening. We had many good items for show and several good tells to make up an interesting evening which all enjoyed. Later, those interested moved to the Annex for a social hour.

SSTV Slow Scan Television is a rapidly growing facet of Amateur Radio, and perhaps one of the most intriguing. SSTV permits the transmission of pictures on any standard voice channel, telephone included, as compared to standard television which occupies the same space in the spectrum as would be required for about 1,300 single sideband voice signals. Of course you don't get something for nothing, and the trade-off here is that you only get one picture in eight seconds instead of thirty per second. So the pictures are not "movies." Steve Towle, KØSVW, has been active on SSTV and has worked many DX (foreign) stations on SSTV, and has many interesting signals on tape. Steve's equipment will be on display at the Mall.

 $\underline{F.C.C.}$ A late word on the cancellation of the civil service administered FCC exams as reported by HR Report, March 5, 1976, reveals that the $\underline{\text{EXAMS}}$ FCC will probably continue with the civil service exam procedure in Rock Island through June 30. They will then start the quarterly schedule in the Quad Cities, perhaps beginning in July. Applications should be sent to the Chicago office as usual and they will inform you of the exam date. The Kansas City Office is still giving the quarterly exams in Des Moines.

EMERGENCY The WRØACU Autopatch was recently put to good use for some emergency traffic. On March 7, 1976, Ed Miltner, WBØOUP, spotted an ac-AUTOPATCH cident outside of town and relayed the information to Bob Lucas, WAØDXZ, who used the autopatch to call the sheriff from his car. The sheriff dispatched officers to the scene of the accident. Good use of the autopatch! For those of you unfamiliar with VHF-FM activity and repeaters a word or two of explanation may be in order. First, WRØACU is the Iowa City repeater located on top of the Physics Building, and its function is to retransmit with greater power and range signals it receives on its input frequency. Since a phone is used for remote control of the repeater, it is convenient to connect the phone to the repeater in such a way that mobile stations using a telephone touch tone pad (dial) can dial any number in the local calling area, thus turning a 2 meter mobile rig into a mobile telephone. Very handy, wouldn't you agree?

PROPAGATION

Solar Activity continues at a low ebb with no significant changes expected. Propagation on 21 and particularly 28 MHz, in spite of seasonal improvement, will continue to be disappointing.

MARCH 15-30

Polar path propagation at this time of the year on the lower frequency bands should be excellent. Disturbed periods are expected March 16-19 and 25-28, with the remainder of the forecast period (including the ARRL CW DX contest) yielding overall good conditions. The prognosis is not so good however, for CQ's WPX contest.


There are many local amateurs active on Radio Teletype (RTTY), and RTTY they find it a fascinating mode of communication. Several of those active on RTTY include Mike Nowack, WBØHOG, Dave Christ, KØLUM, and Gene Weiner, KØCKX. Teletypes are available on the surplus market for very reasonable prices, often less than \$100. Connection to radio equipment is relatively simple, and many circuits for doing so have been published in the amateur radio magazines, and much commercial equipment for this purpose is available. Teletype equipment will be among that on display at the Mall, March 27 and 28.

VHF is Very High Frequencies and is defined as that band of frequencies VHF FM between 30 and 300 MHz. There are three amateur bands in that region, 6 Meters (50-54 MHz), 2 Meters (144-148 MHz), and $1\frac{1}{4}$ Meters (220-225 MHz). The currently most popular is 2 Meters, and repeaters (see the article on Emergency Autopatch) are what is making it so popular. With the aid of a repeater a l watt portable radio is capable of communicating over a range of 50 miles or more. Repeaters also offer such niceties as Autopatch. There are currently about 25 members in the Iowa City Repeater Association, which sponsors the Iowa City repeater, WRØACU.
