### OPERATING NOTES: CONTESTS

Well, I guess I'm running out of things I know about, so it's time to plagiarize! Anybody out there an expert on anything? Not an expert? Bither way, we'd be pleased to print your comments/article/discussion...

At any rate, Field Day is coming up in a couple of months, so it seems appropriate to say something about contesting. Not interested? Well, you better be, because there aint no way to avoid them unless you stick to two meter FM (even then occasionally competitive). On many weekends, most notably Field Day, non-contest operating seems to be of a secondary or almost nonexistant activity in the HF spectrum. If you can't lick 'em, join 'em!

Upon deciding to participate in a contest, the logical question is, "How can I win?" There are two ways: You can win by winning (very difficult), or you can win by losing (easily done). We'll try to give some indication of both methods here....

How to win (1): Take an inventory of your current holdings: Power, antenna (gain, directivity, height), receiver (selectivity, sensitivity, dynamic range), stamina (phsical, emotional, mental), understanding of spouse, work area, padding on chair, and (if so included) booze and cigarettes. Got it? Double all of these (within legal limits) and you would be extremely lucky to win. Add 8 times your present operating skill and you have a chance

Now, those things you're supposed to double, can be with enough planning, time, budgeting, etc. The hooker is the operating skill. That can be gained by losing contests. What's lost in points and multipliers is gained in experience, which brings us around to our second way of winning....

How to win (2): Jump in ther and give it a try. A few hours of November Sweepstakes (CW and phone) participation will improve your copying ability due to the complicated exchange involved. Field Day boosts operating efficiency and immunity to QRM. The open CD party gives you a chance to learn from the best. Novices and Techs can paricipate in most contests, as well as the Novice Roundup. All of these, plus numerous other U.S. and DX events, have the fringe benefit of possibly picking up a new state or country. Best of all, it's fun.

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
